The boat trareled some three hundred and forty miles, and lid not meet with any obstacle to the navigaion. We are assured that there are no snags n the river, no rapids of a formidable characer; and a gentleman who accompanied the exedition, declares the San Joaquin to be the nolest river in California. We regret that the expedition was unprofitable to the enterprising rojectors, the population in the Fort Miller egion being but small and the miners of the resno having been driven off by the high waer.
