There is nothing new or of interest from Sacramento. The papers of yesterday were regularly received, and at an early hour, from which, however, we have nothing to extract. The election and crevasse excitements have died away, leaving nothing but the proceedings of the new Common Council to engage the attention of the residents.

Fight with the Indians at Yreka.

YREKA, April 3, 1853.

I hasten to inform you of our safe arrival at this place a few days ago. We, Goldsmith and myself, had to encounter many hardships and difficulties before reaching our destination, at one time being compelled to fight. The Indians were about attacking our train, which was rather large, comprising over 70 mules. After half an hour's struggle, we succeeded in getting the better of them, but not without wounds. Two of our Spaniards were slightly, and another one was, as we then supposed, mortally wounded; we, however, brought him to Yreka, where he is likely to recover. We lost not one of our mules.

Provisions are selling at reasonable prices. Flour commands but 35 cents.

The Trinity trail from Shasta to Yreka is now passable for pack mules.

Miners on Althouse and Humbug Creeks are doing particularly well.
