

We find the annexed items in the *Shasta Courier* of Saturday last :

FROM TRINITY.—The news from Trinity has not been of much interest during the past week. The miners are doing about as well as usual, and business is represented to be lively. No depredations have been committed by the Indians. The trail from this place to Trinity river and Weaverville is now in fine travelling condition, and large pack trains pass over it daily. The excitement caused by the discovery of some rich deposits of gold on Dead Wood Creek has abated. No portion of the creek remains unclaimed, and the richness of the stream will soon be thoroughly tested.

FROM TRINITY AND WYREKA.—Mr. Rogers, of Cram, Rogers & Co.'s Express, arrived from Wyreka yesterday. He reports Indian difficulties, in which forty Indians were killed. He was not in possession of full particulars.

TWENTY MULES STOLEN.—We have been informed that a camp on the Shasta Valley trail, near the Back Bone, was robbed on the 5th inst. of twenty mules. The owner, with whose name we are unacquainted, was on his way to this place. He had not a sufficient force with him to pursue the Indians who committed the theft, and some of the stolen animals have since been recovered. It is now extremely hazardous to travel the Sacramento Valley without a party of sufficient numbers to repel the attack of a large force of Indians.
