**From the Upper Tuolumne.**

We learn from our correspondent at Don Pedro's Bar, Tuolumne, that the Indians have stolen several animals from that vicinity, amongst others a span of valuable horses, the property of our friend J. M. Billings, Esq., who intends running a stage line via Don Pedro's to Coulterville.

The Indians have, within a fortnight, driven off to the mountains from the neighborhood of Oak Flat, Pena Blanco and Coulterville, some fifty animals, none of which, so far, have been recovered.

A party of Americans and others from Maxwell's Creek have started in pursuit, amply provided with provisions and ammunition for two weeks, with the intention of following them to their retreats in the Sierra Nevada. We heartily wish them success, as nothing but a salutary chastisement will teach these rascals a lesson.

We hear a rumor also of the Indians of Chowchilla and Fresno having recommenced their depredations in the Mariposa region, and that that the men of that section are arming for a mountain campaign, having removed their families to Fort Miller for safety.—*Stockton Journal, April 25th.*
