Daily Alta California, Volume 3, Number 127, 7 May 1852 — WHIG STATE CONVENTION.

The Whig State Central Committee have issued a call for a State Convention, to be held in Sacramento on the first Monday of June next. The convention is to nominate Presidential Electors, Judge of the Supreme Court, Members of Congress and such other officers as may be necessary to be chosen at the next general election.

The basis of representation in the body is to be as ollows:

Two delegates for every one thousand votes, with an additional delegate when the fractional vote exceeds five hundred; and when the vote of any county is less than one thousand, said county to be entitled to two delegates. The vote given at the last general election in each county to be considered the rule of apportionment.
