SACRAMENTO NEWS.

[PER GREGORY'S EXPRESS.]

The particulars of the recent murder, near Deer Creek, and of the execution of the murderers, are thus related in the *Sacramento Union* :

ANOTHER MURDER BY THE INDIANS.—THREE OF THE MURDERERS HUNG.—We are informed by a gentleman just down from Yuba River, that a man, name unknown, was murdered on Sunday afternoon, on the road between Bridgeport and Deer Creek. He had been to Downieville, and was on his way to Marysville at the time of the occurrence. He was attacked by four Indians, three of whom shot him in the breast with arrows. They then beat him with clubs and stones, breaking his cheek bone and otherwise severely bruising him. They fled on the appearance of a teamster, who assisted him into his wagon and drove him to the first house, where he died in about half an hour. He was buried close to the house, which is situated about three miles from Bridgeport.

On Monday afternoon a company of men went to the Indian rancheria in that vicinity, took the Chief, and threatened to kill him if he did not produce the murderers. On Tuesday morning he brought in three of the Indians, and soon after the fourth. The Chief said that he knew they were the murderers by the arrows shot into the body. They were tried on Tuesday morning, near Bridgeport, by a jury of miners, and three of them found guilty; the other was released. The convicted Indians were condemned to be hung at one o'clock on Tuesday noon, which sentence was carried into effect.

A meeting was held at Rose's Bar, on the 21st ult., in which resolutions were passed discarding the present mode of settling claims to mining interest, by a resort to courts of law. The objections urged were upon the ground of costs, which, it is alleged, weigh most heavily upon the miners. Steps have been taken to arbitrate all disputes at the Bar alluded to.—*Dem. State Journal*.
