From San Diego-Indian Outbreak in San Buenaventura.

News had reached San Diego to the effect that an uprising of the Tulare tribe had taken place, and that a difficulty was apprehended in suppressing the revolt. The *San Diego Herald* of the 5th learned that they had concentrated to the number of between two hundred and fifty and three hundred strong, and that they were making inroads on the cattle and property of the Mission of Santa Buenaventura. The whites in that district had become alarmed, and were arming themselves to resist this aggression. A formidable coalition is supposed to exist between the above mentioned tribe and the Santa Buenaventura Indians.

In the opinion of the *Herald*, the presence of a military force will be necessary to protect the place, as the whole number of white males fit for service in that place does not exceed forty or fifty, and will be incapable of carrying on their usual avocations for the support of their families, and at the same time make a campaign against their wary and treacherous foe.

DESPATCHES.—A special messenger, with dispatches for Mr. Bartlett, U. S. Boundary Commission, arrived here on the steamer *Ohio*, on Wednesday, and left for the Colorado, to overtake the surveying party, which left this place on the 29th ult.—*Herald*.

SHOOTING.—Judge J. J. Ames issued a warrant yesterday, on complaint of Frank Stone, for the arrest of one Thomas Carter, for shooting an Indian by the name of Eiego, at Santa Ysabel, on Friday last. Carter is supposed to have escaped in the direction of Los Angeles.—*Ib*.
