**Another Murder by Indians.**

From the Sacramento *Union* we have the particulars of another Indian murder. On the 9th instant, Messrs. Emmerson and George Ellis were riding in the neighborhood of Iron Hill, when a shot was fired from the side of the road which took fatal effect on the body of Mr. Ellis. A second shot was fired, and Mr. Emmerson, finding his friend dead, made his escape to Cold Spring, where collecting a party they returned to the spot. Ellis was found dead, his head bruised as with a stone, one shot entering in the region of the heart, and another in the head. The tracks of two Indians were discovered.

Mr. Ellis was from Massachusetts and a man of family. **THE DRAGOONS**—From the Yreka Mountain *Herald* we learn that two companies of the First Regiment of Dragoons, under the command of Lieutenant Radford, will leave Fort Jones, Scott Valley, for Tuolumne and Goose Lakes, on the emigrant road between Yreka and Humboldt River, to protect the emigrants on the "so-haw" navigation from the depredations of the Indians on that part of the route—*Marysville Herald*.
