Mountain Herald extra of the 8th

The Yreka Mountain *Herald* extra of the 8th says :
Yesterday, about noon, the Humbug and Yreka volunteers, under the command of Captains Rhodes and Goodall, who have, for some time back, been fighting the Rogue River Indians, returned. They inform us that a treaty has been concluded between the Indians and the Whites, and that the Indians are giving up their guns and amunition. We will publish the treaty in our paper Saturday. Too much praise cannot be bestowed upon our gallant citizens who rendered such timely and effective aid to our neighbors of Rogue River valley. They have proven, as our countrymen ever have, the bravery and patriotism of the American people, and that they are ever as ready and willing, however great the sacrifice, to defend the lives and property of their fellows as to avenge the murder of their countrymen.
It is rumored that the Cayuse and Nez Perce Indians, on the Columbia and Umatilla rivers, have broken out and drove all the whites from that portion of the country.
