

Later News from Northern California—Further Indian Difficulties threatened—Mining Intelligence, &c., &c.

Mr. Cronley, who left Klamath county on the 7th inst., arrived in this city yesterday, by the land route, and to him we are indebted for interesting information respecting that remote section of the State. Mr. C. is a veteran pioneer and mountaineer, having been a resident of California since '45, and until the discovery of gold, a citizen of the lower country.

Our informant having left Klamath on the day of the election, of course brings no returns of the result in that county. He rode from Hamburg Bar, on Klamath river, to Shasta city, a distance of 150 miles, without company, in two days. He met no Indians on the road, but fired at a man whom he mistook for one, but who afterward proved to be a poor insane Dutchman. His shot fortunately missed Mynheer, and he escaped.

There was renewed excitement in relation to threatened hostilities among the Indians on Rogue river, seventy-five miles above Hamburg Bar, and it was rumored that large numbers of the Pitt River, Shasta, Salmon River and Klamath Indians, were concentrated, well armed, at that point. No outbreak had occurred, but the whites conceived themselves in imminent peril.

The mining news is of the most favorable character. A large hill above Hamburgh Point is extensively worked, and miners are making great wages. Numerous rivulets flowing down the almost precipitous sides of the neighboring mountain, afford the diggers an ample supply of water. A Frenchman made, a few days since, \$750, and took out from two pans of earth thirty-six ounces. The earth pays at the depth of two feet below the surface from six to nine dollars per day to the hand, but increases in richness the deeper the diggings.

On the fourth and fifth of the present month, rain fell heavily, and the miners were becoming fearful that an early winter would find them with an inadequate supply of provisions.

Mr. Cronley is himself down to replenish his stores, and will return by water to Crescent City, thence to Hamburgh Bar, where he designs spending the ensuing winter.
