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Bigler's majority over Waide in Siskiyou county is 184.
Peace has not yet been concluded between the whites and Indians. The whites went out on the day appointed to meet the Indians and conclude the treaty. But three wild Indians made their appearance, who said that the following day was the one appointed—that the whites had made a mistake of one day. So says report; no living official is yet received from head quarters. Two companies—Capt Owens' and Capt Terry's—were sent on Wednesday evening to Applegate creek. Gen. Lane expresses a determination to pitch into them again, if they do not comply with the stipulations of the treaty forthwith. It is rumored that Capt. Bob Williams and his Rangers had a fight with the Applegate Indians a few days since, and killed about twenty, with a loss of but one man wounded. Mr. J. Rogers, of Gram, Rogers & Co's Express, informs us that 30 wagons arrived in Rogue River Valley on Saturday the 27th ult., principally families from Illinois and Missouri, and on Sunday last 6 wagons and about 600 head of beef cattle.

On the 1st inst. the ladies of Yreka presented, through their Captains, Goodwin and Rhodes, two elegantly wrought flags to the Yreka and Huxbug companies of mounted volunteers. The presentation was made by Gen. Lane, at Camp Aiden.—*Shasta Courier.*

TROOPS FOR ROGUE RIVER.—On Sunday last, four companies of U. S. Infantry, of twenty men each, passed through this place en route for the scene of Indian disturbances in the North. Three companies from Benicia, in command of Major Paton, the poet and soldier; the other 12 from Fort Reading; the whole under command of Col. Wright.—*Shasta Courier.*

The *Courier* says that Col. May, (dem.,) is probably elected over Walter Van Dyke, (whig,) in the Trinity District. He leads the latter over 300 votes in the counties of Siskiyou and Trinity. Kiamath and Humboldt are not yet heard from.

The Trinity river has raised some two feet within the past week. The waters have also risen considerably in the streams in this county in many instances causing a suspension in fluming operations.—*ib.*

Richard Cole, Esq., has retired from the editorial chair of the *El Dorado Republican*.

The *Republican* says:

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Emigrants continue to arrive daily. They are universally in good health, but look wearied, from the effects of their long and tiresome journey. A large amount of stock is also coming in, looking as a general thing in fine condition. We noticed one drove of two hundred young cows. Stock commands a fair price in this market.

A military company called the Placer Guards, has recently been organized in Placerville.

El Dorado county was visited by a heavy rain on the 15th inst., which lasted from eight A. M. till three o'clock P. M. Miners in the vicinity of Placerville, who have been enabled to work in the beds of rivers, are doing well. Should the rain hold off till late in the fall, an immense amount of gold will be taken out — *Rep.*

A new Canalling Company has been organized at Placerville. The Canal will extend from the Cosumnes river, at a point a little above the Big Canyon, to Prairie City, and the country adjacent, passing in the vicinity of White Rock Springs, and traverse the great divide between the Cosumnes and the American rivers, through a district of mining country at least fifteen miles in length by ten in breadth. The length of the canal will be twenty-three miles. Capital stock of the Company \$100,000. — *Placer. Her.*
