Indian disturbances

have occurred on the trail between Weaver ville and Humboldt Bay, to such an extent as to require in the opinion of the Governor of the state a requisition for volunteers to quit the difficulty.

The result of the expedition has been to capture a body of Indians (say one hundred fifty or two hundred). Previous to the fitting out of this expedition, I was called upon by the Governor to know if I could take charge of and provide for the Indians that might be made prisoners, which I agreed to do, intending at the time to send them to the Klamath reservation, which was most convenient.

But it has been suggested in opposition to sending them there, that it is so near their old haunts, that they would very soon escape

④ return to them, which is true, I have  
therefore with the approbation of Mr J. Ross Brown  
consented to receive them at Mendoans, and  
have contracted with the Steam Tug used on the  
bar at Humboldt to bring them down, and I have  
also purchas<sup>d</sup> provisions and Blankets for them  
on credit, there being<sup>no</sup> funds on hand,

The accounts for which  
will be render<sup>d</sup> in due time
