Dear Sir

Indians in California at this time are all peaceable and quiet, and on the Reserves, affairs are in a more than ordinary state of prosperity. Large crops have been planted and the recent rains gives assurance of an abundant harvest.

In consequence of the late reduction of force, but little is I think at present being done, not so much in my opinion as should be. This is owing some what I think to the fact that those who have been discharg^d still remain on the Reservations waiting for their Pay. And this influence instead of being exerted in favor of the progress of business, is rather thrown into the other end of the scale. The sooner they are paid off

off and the agencies are relieved of their
pressure, the better will be the opportunity for
the reduced force to perform the important
duties with which they have been intrusted
