

Yesterday being the day appointed for the removal of the archives of State and the final settlement of the capital question, was one of considerable interest and excitement to the people of Sacramento. About 4 o'clock in the afternoon the Sutter Rifles, under the command of Capt. M. D. Corse, paraded for the purpose of performing escort duty to the Governor and members of the Legislature. At 5½ o'clock, the steamer *Wilson G. Hunt*, Capt. Pool, having on board the Governor, State officers, members of the Legislature, Mayor Hardebergh, Committee of Arrangement and others, turned the point in the river some mile and a half from the city. Her appearance was greeted with the discharge of artillery, which was kept up until she reached the landing. As the noble steamer neared the Levee, decked out in numerous flags, a shout of welcome from over five thousand voices went forth to greet the arrival in the Levee City of the State Government. The cannon thundered out its deafening sounds, and the band played "Hail Columbia." Upon landing a procession was formed, consisting of the Governor, Mayor, State officers, Assemblymen and citizens generally, numbering about one thousand. The procession was escorted by the Sutter Rifles, who presented a very elegant and soldiery appearance, and marched through several of the streets to the Orleans, where Alderman Spalding mounted the stand, and in a short address welcomed the Governor, State officers and members of the Legislature to Sacramento City.

In response to the unanimous call of the assemblage, His Excellency, Governor Bigler, appeared and addressed the meeting. After him various distinguished gentlemen addressed the assembled crowd, and the Sacramentans appeared in high glee, that at last the capital was back in their midst.

**NINE INDIANS KILLED.**—We are informed by Mr. Gardner Brooks, that on Friday, the 17th inst., a party of nineteen white men started from Mr. Casey's ranch on Clover creek, for the purpose of whipping a number of Indians, who, the day previous, had stolen some stock from Hooper's ranch, on Oak Run. The first rancheria they attacked contained but one Indian man, whom they killed. They next fell upon the rancheria of the other tribe headed by "Whitossa," killing eight men and seriously wounding five others.—*Shasta Courier*.
