ANOTHER INDIAN FIGHT — TWENTY-ONE INDIANS KILLED. — The mountain Diggers, living on the Coast Range at the head of Tom's and Stony Creeks, in Colusa county, have of late stolen a large number of cattle and horses from the inhabitants living in the valleys. A gentleman who arrived from Tehama yesterday informs us that on Wednesday of last week, Messrs. Headspeath and Swift headed a party of twelve men and went into the mountains for the purpose of punishing the tribe.

They found a number of them hid in caves, and after a sharp fight, succeeded in killing twenty-one, three of whom unfortunately were squaws. They took twenty men and children prisoners, and brought them to the settlements. A wounded squaw was left under a tree, where she would be found by her friends. It is reported that the Indians from the North are gathering in formidable numbers on the mountains, and the inhabitants of the Western portion of Colusa are organizing and arming for self defence. We shall probably hear of more Indian troubles in that region in a few days. — *State Journal.*
