### Later from the South.

The steamer Southerner arrived at San Francis-

co on Monday morning, bringing five days later news from Los Angeles. We are indebted to Adams & Co. for a copy of the Southern Californian, of July 20th—a new weekly paper published at Los Angeles, by Wm. Butts, Chas. E. Richards & Co., and edited by the gentleman first mentioned. The paper is of a generous size, well printed, and copiously filled with miscellaneous reading matter. We clip the following items of news from the Californian:

**INDIAN DEPREDATIONS.**—We are informed by a gentleman from near San Jose, that lately a party of Pah-Utahs have been stealing large numbers of horses from the different ranches between San Gabriel and San Jose ranche. Don Ygnacio Alvarado had forty-three horses stolen; Mr. Dalton also a large number. As soon as the robbery was discovered a party started in pursuit and overtook the Indians at the Cajon pass. As soon as they found they were pursued, the robbers killed several of the horses and made their escape with such as they could get along with them. About forty of the mares that the Indians abandoned returned to the ranches.

**MURDER.**—On Tuesday morning last, a man was found in the street, near the Church, murdered.—No clue has as yet been had as to the perpetrator of the deed.
