JAIL DELIVERY.—The two Indian prisoners, says the Bulletin, who were indicted for the murder of Capt. Warfield, escaped from the Sonoma jail on Saturday night week. About midnight, the jailor being sound asleep, they arose leisurely and quietly, took the key of the prison, which was lying upon a bench in the room, unlocked the door and stepped out. One of them, Antonio, in his hurry, jumped off the verandah, spraining his ankle and otherwise bruising himself severely. He proceeded some three or four miles up the valley, when becoming entirely crippled and unable to go on, he delivered himself up—still handcuffed. The other prisoner is still at large. Well, if they had not escaped thus, they would have got off in some other way. All our prisoners break jail. Indeed, we see no reason why they should stay in the prison unless they are so disposed. Our county bought the structure which we use as a jail on account of its cheapness; it only cost us \$6,000, and, notwithstanding the great depreciation in value of real estate, it would, if brought to the hammer to-morrow, bring \$600. With such facilities as these for securing prisoners, how wonderful that we should have midnight lynch trials and torch-light executions in Sonoma?
