COUNTY BUSINESS.

The order heretofore made establishing the southern boundary of Mississippi and Natoma townships is set aside, and it is ordered that the Coloma road shall constitute said boundary lines, except that at the Lexington House, the south line of Mississippi township shall be established so as to leave said road and run thence south, thence east, and thence north to said Coloma road, so as to include said Lexington House within the limits of Mississippi township.

It is ordered that an additional precinct be established in San Joaquin township at Edward Rowe's Ranch.
