Sir,

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 27th inst. requesting my opinion as to the correctness of certain vouchers from the use of Thos J. Henley Esq., late Superintendent of Indian Affairs in California, therein enclosed, and to submit in reply the following remarks upon the same.

Voucher No 11.

It will be observed that the dates of the first nine items in this bill are all prior to the 17th of July '58. It is within the knowledge of the Indian Office that I did not leave Washington until the 4th of July, and did not arrive at San Francisco until the 29th of the same month. So much, therefore, of Mr. Henley's explanatory note, as represents that these expenses were incurred on my account, is a transparent falsehood. At the date of the last charge, (Aug. 10) I was at Nome Lickt, where there is a government blacksmith, and where the horses could have been shod without extra charge, I would recommend that the voucher be suspended for explanation.

Voucher No 16.

Mr Clement accompanied M^r Browne and myself from Nome Lickee to a short distance above Napa City, and was with us from the 8th to the morning of the 29th of Aug: in all 16 days. I was not aware that Mr Clement was employed as escort to M^r Browne and myself. He had come up to Nome Lickee with

Mr. Tobin in charge of some government cattle, and I supposed he returned with our party for convenience sake. I may observe here, that I had nothing to do with the arrangements of the trip from Nome Sackee to Mendocino, and thence home. Knowing nothing about the country, I merely told Col. Henley that I desired to visit the reservations, and left every thing to him. There is no road from Nome Sackee to Mendocino, the whole country being an absolute wilderness, and it was necessary to carry our own provisions &c and camp out. It was therefore necessary to have some one to accompany us, but, as, according to the official reports, there is a very large number of horses on the reservations, and many employees who could have been detailed for the purpose, I cannot see the propriety of employing Mr. Clement. I must add, in justice to M^r. C. that he was the most efficient man of the party, and contributed greatly to the enjoyment of the trip.

Voucher No 25.

I can furnish but little information in respect to this voucher: At the date of sub-voucher No 11 (for Steamboat fare from Petaluma) Col. Henley was at Nome Cult. 5 days journey from Petaluma. The Telegraphic messenger (Vouchers 14815) resulted from the negligence of the Clerk, at Nome Sackee, to send to San Francisco, a small trunk containing my official papers, which I had been compelled, for want of means of transportation, to leave there. The trunk was left at Nome Sackee on the 8th of Aug, and, as will appear from the date of the sub-vouchers, had not arrived at San Francisco on the 25th, tho' there is daily communication. I complained to Col. Henley and he then telegraphed. I would call attention to the pencil memoranda on some of the sub-vouchers, showing that the Steam Boat fare of M^r Tobin while collecting the Point Reyes cattle was paid by Col. Henley.

Voucher No 26.

The only item in this voucher of which I have any cognizance is the charge of \$163 "for natural and necessary expenses," while accompanying "J Ross Browne & party" during the month of August. In respect to this I have to observe; first, that Mr. Tobin did not join Mr. Browne and myself until the 8th of Aug, and therefore was not with us 23 days as charged; and second, that during that time, (from the 8th to the 24th) Mr. Tobin ^{was} not subjected to any expense whatever, and could not have spent any money if he had tried. As before stated, we travelled through a wilderness, and carried our own provisions, which were furnished from the reservation stores at Nome Lachee, Nome C. & Mendocino.

Voucher No 28.

The remarks made on Voucher No 16 are applicable to so much of this as relates to the time when Mr. Tobin was with Mr. Browne and myself.

I would respectfully suggest that these vouchers, or copies of them, be sent to Mr. Browne, for examination and report.

The vouchers are herewith returned as requested.
