

The regular daily sales of produce merchandize amounts to one and a half millions of dollars per week, or six millions per month. The actual product daily from the various mills, foundries, &c., is \$11,000, or \$271,000 per month. The value of property real and personal with capital invested in different kinds of business, is nearly \$10,000,000. The total receipts of gold dust may be safely estimated at \$2,750,000.

During the winter months this city is the general rendezvous of stock dealers, whose purchases form no inconsiderable amount, forty or fifty thousand dollars in cash frequently being exchanged for a single drove of cattle.

In thus reviewing the present condition of our city, it is not our desire to draw odious comparisons, but merely to exhibit the glorious reward of industry, energy and perseverance,—the fruits of which stand before us in substantial levees, fire-proof edifices, invaluable water works, planked streets, spacious churches and tasteful dwellings. Who shall predict our future growth and prosperity? It suffices us to compare the past with the present.
