MURDER BY AN INDIAN.—One of two brothers,

named Richardson, residing on Stoney Creek, Colusa county, was horribly murdered a few days since, the deed, as is supposed, having been done by an Indian. He had been captured some months previous by the Richardson's, while in pursuit of a party of copper-colored thieves, who had stolen cattle, and was at the time of the alleged murder, employed as a servant, and at the house in company with his victim only. The brother on his return found the deceased with his head split open, the wound having been evidently inflicted with an axe. The Indian had fled.

The name of the murdered man was Milton Richardson, and he formerly resided at Fort Madison, Iowa.
