**Indian Council at Storm's Ranch—
Speeches by Messrs. Weller, Gwin,
llenley, Digger King Weimer, &c.**

NEVADA, October 2d.

The grand Indian "pow-wow" met to-day according to appointment, at Storm's Rancho. King Weimer and about twenty of the chiefs were present. Messrs. Weller, Gwin and Henley, made speeches. King Weimer replied that he considered he had as good right to the country as any one. The Chinese in particular, he said, by right ought to be removed first. He made a very good speech. He however agreed that a delegation should be sent to the reservation to help put in the crops, and report as to the country; but said that he had no confidence in the whites, as one big white chief had fooled them, and he did not think the present white Mr. Henley any better than the first.

A committee was appointed to draft resolutions. They made a majority and minority report. The majority report was voted on, and Judge Barbour decided it carried. A division was then called for, when the chair said the meeting was adjourned—so the question was not voted on, and they adjourned *a la Broderick*.

The whole proceedings are pronounced a grand "fizzle."
