Sir,

I left San Francisco on the 15<sup>th</sup> Inst for the purpose of visiting the Klamath Indian Reservation and now have the honor to report the following as the result of my investigation -

Waukeet, the Head Quarters of this Reservation is situated five miles from the Mouth of the Klamath River in a beautiful Valley, containing about Eight Hundred Acres - The land is exceedingly fertile and is adapted to the growth of every variety of grain and vegetable -

A large portion of this Valley is still uncultivated, and although not densely timbered contains a considerable undergrowth which will require labor & expense in clearing - At <sup>present</sup> there are over One Hundred and forty Acres, under a high state of cultivation - The immense yield of this farm speaks well for the industry and good management of the Agent and employees and promises great success in the future cultivation of the greater portion of this Valley -

At Hoppe, one mile below this on the North side of the River, there is a small farm of Forty Acres under cultivation & in its immediate vicinity, there are eighty Acres which would be successfully cultivated in addition -

Art. "Iron ore" the site of the present Military establishment, is situated upon a fertile plain on the North side of the Mammoth three fourths of a mile from Head Quarters, which contains about eighty acres of land unoccupied in fertility and of easy cultivation.

Mah-Tuck, two miles from Head Quarters is a small farm of eighty acres, connected with which there are fifty acres which could be turned to a profitable account.

Cap. Lt. Quarters miles from Head Quarters and near above Mah-Tuck is well and advantageously situated. It is surrounded by a country unoccupied for grazing purposes, and is entirely isolated and protected from the intrusions of white settlers. The fertile deer here cultivated is of a rich though somewhat grassy soil. The country is gently undulating and offers advantages, to the successful conduct of our Indian farm not possessed by other portions of the Reserve.

In addition to the above locations there are many places susceptible of improvement, in different portions of this Reservation and which in the course of time can be made to yield largely to the support of Indians.

The buildings at Head Quarters consist of a dwelling house, a Block house

Boon, Huckle and Gummy all well  
and substantially built -

At Wab Bell, there is a good log house  
used as quarters for the employes and  
as a Gummy -

At Pop-El, there are three well built  
houses. The dwelling house is commodious  
and comfortably arranged; the others  
are frame buildings and answer well  
the purposes for which they were designed.

As to the herd upon the accompanying  
mountain, the amount of stock on this  
place is not large. The number of work  
animals is not sufficient to meet the  
demands of the Reservation. It is my  
intention to increase this force at once  
by the transfer of animals from reser-  
vations where they are of little or no  
service to the Blamoth -

I take great pleasure in re-  
-porting to the Department the prosperous  
condition of this Reservation. The number  
of Indians residing upon & constantly  
frequenting this place can not be less than  
two thousand - In the immediate neighbor-  
hood of Wab Bell there resides constantly  
from one hundred and fifty to two hundred  
of them, whose services are always avail-  
-able for farming purposes - They appear well  
-content and contented, as is always the  
case where an abundance of food & occupation  
is found for them -

I look upon the condition of this  
Reservation, as a convincing proof of the

feasibility of carrying out the present  
system of Indian Reservations in this  
State cheerfully.

In view of the further  
progress of this plan, and to forward  
all in my power. The exertions of Mr.  
D. A. Burb the Agent in charge, in placing  
this Reservation in a still more advanced  
condition I have allowed him out  
farms, in addition to those presented  
by my instructions from the Department -  
As the farms are scattered over a  
considerable Area of Country, and the  
farms <sup>at work</sup> are necessarily separated from  
each other, I have considered this measure  
advisable to the interest of the Residee  
and trust that the Department will  
approve the same.
