

MORE MEIGGS DISCLOSURES.—We are informed upon the most reliable and undoubted authority, of a discovery which exhibits the fact, that Henry Meiggs commenced his forging operations as far back as 1852. In the month of July, 1852, Mr. Meiggs held an audited account against the city, for the sum of \$14,000, bearing a monthly interest of three per cent. This account he hypothecated to a party who forwarded it to the Atlantic States, by the steamer of the 15th July, 1852. This account, which is supposed to be genuine, has been in the hands of the party to whom it was first hypothecated, ever since. It now appears that two copies have been made of this account,—forgeries, both of which have been hypothecated by Meiggs, and large sums obtained on them. The principal and interest of the account amount at the present time to upwards of \$25,000. There are also other audited accounts, forged by Meiggs, the aggregate of which amount to a larger one than the above.

THE CALIFORNIA GUARDS—Visit to Admiral Despointes.—The members of this Company, in full uniform, and headed by Kendall's Brass Band, marched through the streets, yesterday, on their way to visit the French frigate *La Forte*, in compliance with a polite invitation received from Admiral Febvrier Despointes. The Company embarked on board of the steamer *Hercules*, at Jackson street wharf. The steamer proceeded towards Rincon Point, where after making a turn steamed in the direction of the frigate, the Band playing lively airs, and salvos being fired from the guns of the Company on the passage up the harbor. It is said that they were received in great style by the Admiral and officers.
