By the arrival of the Goliah we are placed in possession of files of San Diego and Los Angeles paper to the 11th and 19th inst. respectively.

The same painful tragedies still continue to be enacted in Los Angeles, which may not inappropriately be termed the Natchez of California.

The following is the criminal calendar:

Friday, Oct. 13—A young man by the name of Pinkney Clifford was foully murdered at Achard's Livery Stable this evening by one David Brown. It appears that Clifford was sitting in the room occupied as an office, when some altercation of a trivial nature took place, Brown became enraged, and walked up to Clifford—clinched, and plunged a knife into his heart. Clifford died almost immediately, and Brown was taken into custody, and lodged in jail.

on Monday morning last, at 10 o'clock, Brown was brought into court and examined before Justice Eaton. Mr. Thom, District Attorney, appearing for the State. Brown, who appeared perfectly cool and unmoved during the examination, was remanded back to prison to take his trial for the mur-

der of Clifford.

The day after the murder of Clifford by David Brown, which we gave an account of previously, a large meeting of citizens was held at the Court House, to consider the best means of ridding Los Angeles of the gang of villains who now infest it. It was decided to take the case of Brown into their own hands, but after being addressed by the Mayor, it was turned over to the proper authorities.

ROBBERY.—The store of Messrs. Rich & Newmark was entered into on last Sunday evening, and robbed of several articles of clothing, \$40 or \$50 in cash, and some California gold rings, amounting in all to some \$200. A reward of \$50 is offered for the detection of the thieves and recovery of the property.

FROM THE TEJON.—Col. Beall arrived in town yesterday evening from the Tejon, and informs us that matters at the Indian Reservation are in a sad condition; that the Indians are leaving for their homes in the mountains and on the plains, and that the person in charge during Col. Henley's absence has no control over the wild spirits that are around him, but the supplies and grain are being wasted in a shameful manner.—[Star, Oct. 19.
