I have the honor  
to herewith enclose a copy of the report of the  
agent Putney in regard to the condition of the  
Indians under his charge. Mr. Putney is one of  
persons discharged by your order of Nov 18<sup>th</sup> last.  
His compensation is sixty  
dollars per month, and his services are very  
beneficial to the Indians, indeed I know  
of no instance where greater good results,  
from so small an expenditure.

Dear Sir;

During the close of a  
quarter a proper occasion I improve it to  
report to you upon the state, situation &c  
of the Indians in Calaveras County and  
my doing in their behalf for the past year.

As to the number of Indians in this county  
(though somewhat large) it has been im-  
possible to ascertain with any degree of acc-  
uracy — as the different bands are often chang-  
ing their locations and dividing upon account  
of some dissatisfaction with their old Chiefs  
— in which case the malcontents sometimes  
mix with other bands and at others set up  
a new camp for themselves under some head of  
their own.—

I have taken some pains to gather all  
the facts I could in regard to them and  
am satisfied that there are from twelve to  
fifteen distinct Bands in the County —  
numbering all the way from forty to one  
hundred & over in a band — their locations  
are near Murphys two camps — near Valle-  
cito — Angels — Cherokee Couc — San Andree  
— Cane City — Mokelumne Hill — Mokelumne

River - Big Tree - Each one and some in  
different Mountain Valley's - Besides these  
there has been a band of Marauding  
Indians composed as below of Refugees  
from Carson & Washa Valley's (East of the  
state line) and some outlaw "Diggers" -  
who have been prowling about the western  
slope of the Sierra Nevada's for a year  
past stealing cattle and horses to subsist  
upon - I have some of the arrows with  
which they killed some of the oxen of Mr  
Woodruff's near the "Big Trees" which  
the most reliable of our Indians assure  
me belong to the "Pyots" a tribe who  
live on the ~~Washon~~ River near the  
Washas' (or "Washoes"). -

But <sup>with</sup> such I have not been able to do any  
thing. With the Diggers my Endeavours  
have been to afford them such protection  
from abuse and to treat them with such  
as would most speedily enable me to  
obtain such an influence with them  
as to ultimately induce them to  
leave for some Reservation; and to  
this end I have sent out for the various  
chiefs who have mostly come in & con-  
versed with me - I have furnished some  
Medicines and provisions for the sick.

Promised and inform at my own cost -  
have encouraged them to improve the char-  
acter and structure of their cabins - to  
lay up more food for winter - to abstain  
from the use of intoxicating liquors  
and other evils contracted by their contact  
with the Whites which are fast decimating  
their numbers. - I have also afforded  
them protection in their property such  
as horses when I knew they had  
honestly purchased them by giving  
them an official certificate of the fact.  
And also given them influential passports  
from Camp to camp - of which they  
think very much -

I have also proscribed all cases of  
liquor selling to them when proof  
could be found of the fact - and in a  
few cases have punished the Incorrigible  
Drunkard (Indian) by tying him - which  
I think has had some effect for good.  
From all I can hear I am also satisfied  
that these Indians are dying at about  
the rate of two per cent per year while  
their increase appears small.

I have thought and am still of the  
opinion that if the state of Indian fund  
would admit of the payment of expenses

that I might prevail upon a delegation of  
chiefs from this Region to accompany  
me to look at the Reservation near  
Mendocino and throw the idea into  
this communication for your consideration  
and have the honor to remain
