

FROM THE GILA.—*Battle between the Yumas and Cocopas—Passage of Sheep, &c.*—By the arrival of Major Brown from the Gila, we learn that an insursion has lately been made by the Yuma Indians upon the country occupied by the Cocopas. The Yumas reported a battle as having taken place, in which ten Cocopas were killed, and thirteen wounded. One hundred and three thousand sheep were within a few days march of the Ferry. Seven thousand were being crossed, the day before the Major left. The price of ferriage is twenty-five cents per head. The officers and soldiers at Fort Yuma were all well. Lieut. McLean had gone to the mouth of the Colorado with a party of men, to open the road and bring up provisions from the schooner Gen. Patterson, lately arrived from above. Poor Mac, he has undoubtedly found out by this time that the Post at the Gila "is all our fancy painted it." May Heaven, or the Secretary of War, soon send that garrison relief!
