

FALLS ON THE COSUMNES.--A correspondent of the *Placerville Herald* describes a scene in the neighborhood of Saratoga Village, (sixteen miles from Placerville:)

"About a mile below the forks of the Cosumnes, there is one of the most magnificent water-falls in this State. The Cosumnes river commences here to form a cannon, and running among steep and rugged rocks, rushes on in angry and foaming confusion, down this cannon, until it reaches a large, oblong hole, worn through the solid rock, through which it leaps; and then at an angle of about fifty degrees, descends and forms a waterfall of over 300 feet, rivaling in magnificence the celebrated Niagara. On its sides stand mountains of perpendicular and overhanging rock, nearly 400 feet in height, the whole making an imposing combination of magnificent grandeur and rugged beauty. This spot is called by the indians "Yomet," or sounding rock, where a sound given is echoed and re-echoed ten different times, diminishing in power as it ascends to the summit of these upright rocks.

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
