OUR INDIAN RESERVATIONS.—From a Report sent by Col. Henly, Superintendent of Indian Affairs in this State, to Washington on the 14th April last, the *California Farmer* gathers the following information:

Tejon.—1,000 acres wheat; 300 acres barley; 200 acres oats; 100 acres in Indian gardens.—About 800 Indians are here employed.

Fresno.—300 acres wheat; 300 acres barley; 50 acres Indian gardens; 400 Indians employed.

Nomlacke.—700 acres wheat; 300 acres barley; 100 acres oats; 100 acres corn; 50 acres Indian gardens; 1,500 Indians employed.

There are also new settlements being begun at King's river, (Four Creeks) and at Klameth; at these places potatoes are the principal products.—Here are about 500 Indians. At every station or department, superintendents and well qualified agents have charge of squads of Indians, who make weekly reports of all labor to Col. Henly.
