HOOPA VALLEY.—Mr. J. A. Kleiser, of Hoopa, carried up last week mill stones and running gear for his mill. He will have it in operation in less than a month. The surplus crop of wheat, over and above that for home consumption and seed, will exceed two thousand barrels. Eighteen months ago the first settlement was made; now there are hotels, blacksmith shops, and all the accompaniments of a flourishing settlement. A postoffice, election precinct, a school, and a Masonic Lodge will, ere long, be established. In addition to the wheat crop, large crops of potatoes, melons and vegetables of every description, will be produced this year. Heretofore flour, potatoes, &c., have been packed from this place through Hoopa Valley to the Salmon river mines; hereafter the farmers of Hoopa will furnish those supplies and enjoy the monopoly which the cost of packing hence to the Valley—six cents per pound—allows them, as none of the coast farmers can compete with the propinquity of the Valley to the mines. Those who were so fortunate as to secure farms have a fortune before them.
