We understood that the sons of Mr. King have been arrested, and are undergoing an examination before a Justice of the Peace.

Much excitement and feeling was manifested in their favor, their house being guarded by some fifty men during the night, there being some fear that Johnson's friends might attempt to revenge his death.

The King boys were examined before Justice Martin, and committed to await the action of the Grand Jury.

Indian Murder.—Justice Eaton held an inquest on an Indian, who was found on Tuesday morning in the vineyard of Thomas Sanchez. He was about eighteen years old, and is supposed to be from San Diego. When found, his head was bruised and mashed, as though done with stones, and stripped entirely naked except a pair of socks on his feet. The supposition is that he was murdered by Indians during the night previous, as the occupants knew nothing of the affair.—Los Angeles Star.

Capt. Martin, from the Tejon Reservation, informs us that the work of plowing and seeding is progressing finely, and that over 800 acres of wheat is now in the ground. Several thousand bushels of last year's crop is still on hand, and as a flouring mill has just been started, there will be an abundance of breadstuff until another harvest. The Indians are peaceful and industrious, and everything goes on smoothly and prosperously.—Ibid.
