Mr. Farley offered a resolution that 2,000 copies of the Surveyor General's report be printed. Laid over.

The House refused to allow members pen-knives, but voted to authorize the Sergaant-at-Arms to procure a filterer.

Mr. Douglass offered the following concurrent re-

solutions:

Resolved, That our Senators be instructed and our representatives be requested to call the attention of the proper department at Washington, to the claims of Messrs. Dent, Vantine & Co., of San Joaquin county, for provisions furnished the Indians on the Stanislaus river, in said county, pursuant to the order of the U. S. Indian Commissioners for this State, in the years 1851 and 1852, and which orders were not paid for want of an appropriation.

Resolved, That his Excellency, the Governor, be requested to forward a copy of the above resolution to our Senators and Representatives, and also to the head of the Indian Department at Washington.

After discussion, and various motions, the reso-

lutions were laid on the table.

Mr. Watkins offered a resolution that the Committee on Internal improvements be requested to inquire into the expediency of introducing a bill for an act for the improvement of navigation at the mouth of San Joaquin Creek. Adopted.

Mr. Ashley offered a concurrent resolution that the two houses adjourn sine die on the 2d day of

April next. Laid temporarily on the table.

Mr. Curtis offered a concurrent resolution requesting our representatives in Congress to use their exertions to obtain an appropriation of \$75,000 for the construction of a military road from the head of the Sacramento valley to the head of the Shasta valley. Laid on the table.

Mr. Amyx moved that 1,000 copies of the bill for an act to prohibit the sale of intoxicating drinks be

published. Carried.

Mr. Buffum offered a resolution that the thanks of the Assembly be tendered to Rev. O. C. Wheeler for his services as Chaplain of the House, and that he be invited to continue the same.

Mr. Johnson called for a divison of the question. Mr. Douglass moved that the latter clause of the

resolution be stricken out.

After sundry speeches and motions, on motion of Mr. Burke, the whole subject was laid on the table. The House then adjourned.
