Difficulty on the Klamath—Secret Organization— Embezzlement—Murder Case—Funding the City Debt—Sparious Coin—Manhattan Fire Co.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 6th.

The brig J. S. Cabot arrived here yesterday from Klamath Bay. Mr. Francis Campbell, one of her passengers, gives the following account of the murder of whites by the Indians on the Klamath. Mr. C. saw two of his partners slaughtered. The cause of the difficulty was the sale of fire arms to the Indians by some of the whites, after which sale the arms were demanded, and threats made that unless this demand was complied with their camps would be fired after the expiration of four days. Some fifty of the Indians refused to give up the arms, when their camps were set on fire. The Indians then made an attack upon the whites, killed six and wounded two mortally. The following is a list of the killed and wounded: Chas. K. Proctor, of Proctorville, Vermont; Chandler D. Dunham, of Plymouth, Mass.; Wm. Wheeler, of Wadsworth county, Wis.; Thos. O'Neil, of New Orleans, and John Smith, of St. Domingo, killed. The wounded are Messrs. William Lamb, of Oregon, and Johnson, of Mo.

Eleven Chinese were arrested on Saturday for extorting money from their countrymen, but were released for want of legal proof. It is said that they are a part of a secret organization in this country, to raise means to overthrow the present dynasty in their own country. The parties agrived in this case were afraid to testify, because of threats of death made by this secret organization. Carvallo was the only witness against them. He stated that each member had taken a solemn oath to carry out their designs even at the cost of their lives. They number in this State about three thousand, seven hundred of whom are in this city; they levy contributions with threats of assassination, and, says Mr. C., many of the murders in the mines might be traced to their agency. It is estimated that the forced contributions of this society amount annually to \$150,000 in this State.

A nolle prosequi has been granted in the cases of ex-Mayor Garrison and C. D. Carter, for embezzleing the public money. The ex-Mayor's Clerk is imprisoned, not being able to raise the fifty thousand dollars bail.

Kerney and Carson, arraigned for the murder of Bay, have been released, and Landrum sent up to the Court of Sessions, charged with his sounds.
