

NARROW ESCAPE.—Another lynching affair a few days since on the San Soaquin was only prevented by the vigilance of an acquaintance of the accused. The *San Joaquin Republican* says that on the 4th inst. a Mexican was arrested in the vicinity of Islip's Ferry, who was suspected of being in league with a party of cattle thieves, and also for harboring a Californian who had escaped from Stockton jail. Mr. A. F. Rudler hearing of the affair, and knowing the Mexican to be a worthy man, made the same known to deputy-sheriff Stewart, who agreed to accompany him and prevent the commission of violence, in which they were successful. Mr. Ruller informs the *Republican* that he firmly believed the Mexican was entirely innocent of the charges brought against him, and is esteemed an honest and upright man. The case that occurred a few days since, at Red Bluffs, by which an innocent man lost his life, should be a warning to all who engage in the lynch code of punishing offenders.

THE COLUSI RESERVATION.—The editor of the *Grass Valley Telegraph* has had an audience with King Weimeh, who has recently returned from a long stay at the Reservation. He represents all things at that place as in a most favorable condition. Plenty of game and other eatables, good accommodations, Indians contented, work progressing, &c. He says he has returned for the purpose of inducing thither more of his tribe, when, he says they will be much better off than if continuing here. To the question, as to whether he should visit the Capital, before his return, he answered most indignantly, and evinced a most hearty contempt for the actions of our wise legislators, whose proceedings are not to him alone, singular and unaccountable.
