Tejon Reservation.—Col. Thomas J. Henly, Superintendent of Indian affairs, returned from the reservation in the Tejon Pass about ten days ago. He informs us that the Indians have been very industriously employed in agricultural pursuits, having put in very large crops of wheat and barley; also have raised a large amount of garden vegetables for their own consumption.

The object of the Superintendent in putting so much of the soil under cultivation, has been to provide a sufficiency of food over and above the supply required for a single season, inasmuch as it not unfrequently happens in that section of the State that the drought is so long continued and severe, as to entirely cut off the growing crops. The Indians are peaceable and industrious.
