**Further from Northern California.**

By the arrival of the *America* we have received files of the *Humboldt Times* and the *Crescent City Herald* to the 2d inst.

Humboldt county now raises its own butter and bacon, and by next year will produce lard, bacon, &c., for shipment. Pork is selling at from twelve to fifteen cents per pound, and roasting pigs at \$2 each.

The woods and prairies of Humboldt county are filled with salmon berries and blackberries.

The temperance cause is progressing.

There were 560 tons of merchandise discharged at Crescent City during the month of May.

KLAMATH RESERVATION. — From Mr. Whipple, who came up a passenger on the *Sea Bird*, we learn that a number of Indians have already been placed on the Reservation, extending from the mouth of the Klamath up that stream 30 miles. — *Herald*.
