*Bloody Battle with Indians—Congressional Dele-
gate Election, &c.*

E. W. Tracy, agent of the Pacific Express Company at Shasta, writes us from that place, under date of June 8th, as follows :

MESSRS. EDITORS :—Information has just reached this place that the Indians in Rogue River Valley have again commenced depredations on the whites. Report says that sixteen whites have been killed. The U. S. troops have been ordered to the scene of hostilities from Fort Jones.

The election at Jacksonville went off quietly—only four fights and nobody killed.

Gen. Joe Lane, so far as heard from, is ahead of his opponent, Gaines.
