FROM CHINA.—The *Polynesian* of June 2d, in speaking of matters in China, says:

The latest accounts from China represent the small-pox as raging in Hongkong, and also among the shipping at Shanghai.

After having been in possession of the Revolutionists for two years, the city of Shanghai has again come into the hands of the Imperialists, who immediately removed all the cannon from the walls, fearful, it would seem, that such arms might be turned against them. Most of the rebels escaped; only about 400 were taken and beheaded.

The natives say that Gov. Keih, in his dispatch to the Emperor, has stated that the French were the first to assist in bringing about obedience to the Imperial authority; while the English Consul was willing to give up the race course, and to allow of a battery being established at Taylor's bridge, by which means supplies were prevented reaching the city; but no mention is made of the part taken by the Americans in the reduction of the place.

LATER FROM OREGON.—From the *Chronicle's* summary of news, brought by the schooner Empire, we clip the subjoined items:

INDIAN OUTBREAK.—Another Indian outbreak, says the *Oregonian* of June 16th, has commenced in Southern Oregon, between the Applegate, Illinois and Coast Indians and the whites. The Indians have killed several white persons, and committed other depredations upon the settlers; such as shooting stock, driving mules and cattle into the mountains, &c., &c. The settlers have become alarmed, and have determined to make a treaty with these bands, which will be lasting to the end of time. The Rogue River Indians have been collected together upon the reservation, by Dr. Ambrose, the Indian agent, and were peaceable when we left, a few days ago.

OREGON SALT.—The *Oregonian* has been shown a fine specimen of salt, manufactured on the Willamette Slough, about fifteen miles below Portland. The salt was of the finest quality—of a pure white color—free from all impurities, and equal in every respect to the famous Salinas salt manufactured at Salinas, in the State of New York. The springs from which the water flows are said to be inexhaustible. Machinery is being prepared wherewith to manufacture enough salt for our home consumption at a large reduction from the price now paid for it, and also large quantities for exportation.
