Three grist mills have been established in the county, which amply supply the necessities of the population for breadstuffs. It is nearly five months since a steamer has touched at the port of San Luis. It is said that a bid of one of the citizens to run a weekly mail between Monterey and San Luis has been accepted.

The Indians are fishing on the river, and give no cause of complaint. A trading post under the supervision of Birk & Johnson, accommodates the miners in all their various wants.
