dication of his position and his rights as a naturalized citizen. With the exception of a few expressions, such as "Idiot Boy of the Tribune," (the editor is rather much given to calling names)—the article is conceived in good taste, and the sentiments it contains expressed in appropriate as well as forcible language. That a respectful and courteous demeanor as an editor produces a return in kind, is a fact which the members of the profession should never forget.

Fire in Forest City.—On the authority of the Nevada Journal we learn that a fire broke out in Forest City, on Wednesday evening, in a building situated near the Church, and occupied by a French family. Two houses were consumed. The fire is supposed to be the work of an incendiary, a Frenchman, the occupant of the house in which the fire originated. While engaged in a family quarrel, he had been heard to utter threats that he would fire the building in which he lived.

Nor Gone.—The statement that Gov. Bigler had left for the country, turns out to be incorrect, as he is reported to be still in the city. We reiterate our protest against the practice of a Governor leaving his official duties to perambulate the State as a candidate for re-election, before his term of office has expired.
