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**More Murders by the Indians in the North—
Four Men Killed—Two Indians Hung—
Trouble Expected.**

Editors Alta:—We have just received the following intelligence from Yreka, per Horsley & Brastow's Express.

YREKA, July 31.—Two Indians came into town this afternoon as spies, and were taken prisoners.

Two white men were killed on Humbug Bar, Scott's River, yesterday.

It is reported that two packers were killed on Applegate Creek, while on their way to this place. It is the general impression that there will be a general outbreak.

Every buck Indian that can be seen on the mountains, will be shot.

Still Later.

We have since learned that the two Indian prisoners were hung.

The Chief of the Rogue River Indians vows he will have vengeance on Humbug Creek.
