LATER FROM THE NORTH.—By the arrival of the brig Quoddy Bell, we have received the Humboldt *Times* of the 11th instant. That paper confirms the report of twelve men being killed by the Indians. It was, it appears, the Klamath Indians who committed these murders.

The assessed value of the property in Humboldt county for the year 1855 amounts to \$477,000—a depreciation in value from that of last year of nearly thirty per cent.

FROST—On the mornings of the 30th and 31st of July, and 1st and 6th of August, says the *Times*, we had severe frosts; that of the 6th, in some localities on the prairie, injured young vegetables very much.

WHOLESALE ARREST.—Mr. Cesar Schnepfel procured the arrest this morning of thirteen mechanics and laborers, who were engaged in tearing down a house on the corner of Lombard and Francisco streets, on a charge of malicious mischief. The whole affair appeared to be this, that the principal of Schnepfel had rented a certain piece of ground to somebody who had put up on it a house. The tenant failed to pay the rent, and by the terms of the lease the improvements were thereby forfeited; last evening a demand was made for the rent in arrear, and the debtor, as it seems, fearing some process, employed a number of men, and commenced very early this morning to tear the house down.
