

**NOMEE LACKEE RESERVATION.**—The Grass Valley *Telegraph* gives us the following information respecting the Indian tribes now on the Reservation in Tehama :

We had the pleasure, the past week, of an interview with Mr. P. Storms, of the Tehama Reservation. Mr. S. informs us that the Indians are becoming more and more pleased with the change in their locality and circumstances. Both sexes are quiet and industrious. The males attend to all the field labor, the building of huts, &c., while the squaws confine themselves to the domestic concerns of the community. They are becoming handy with the needle and scissors, and now make in a very substantial and neat manner, all the clothing, hats, &c., required by both sexes. The wheat crop will come up to about 30,000 bushels, 4,000 acres having been put in. The grasshoppers have nearly ruined the vegetable crops, particularly the water-melons, which last is looked upon by the Indians as their greatest calamity, they having made great calculations on an abundant supply of their favorite fruit.

There are now some twelve or fifteen hundred Indians at this reservation, the only one in fact in the State which may be said to have been completely successful. Very few manifest any disposition to leave, and those who do leave, generally return in a very short time, of their own accord. The greatest obstacle in the way of removing the Indians from most localities, is the opposing efforts of a few white men, who are interested in keeping them where they are from motives of gain.

As an evidence of the better condition of the Indians since their removal, we would mention that but one death has yet occurred among the entire body of Nevada and Yuba Indians since their removal, and that was the result of disease contracted before removing. The Indians there are quite, orderly and contented; quarrels and contentions, even of slight moment, are of rare occurrence. On the other hand, no less than three persons have been shot down in their camps in this vicinity within the past six weeks, the result of unrestrained passions and drunken revelries.
