INDIAN MASSACRE — We are informed by Capt Camman, of the brig *S. R. Jackson*, arrived recently from Coos Bay, that just previous to his sailing from the Bay, news was received of the murder of seventeen miners by the Indians in Rogue River. A Mr. Flannagan, of Coos Bay, was among the number, but the names of the others were not reported. The massacre took place about the 20th ult. The people in the neighborhood were in a state of great excitement, and had held several meetings, with the view of organizing to exterminate the Indians.
