

THE ARCHIBALD GRACIE.—The barque *Archibald Gracie*, supposed to have been chartered to proceed to San Juan, with recruits for Walker, was intending to sail this morning, and will doubtless leave in the course of the day. We are positively assured that it never has been the intention to send her to San Juan, but that the idea became current from the fact that six cannon were taken on board of her a day or two since, and that these being seen, it was supposed by the men who came down here to proceed to Nicaragua, and who were left by the *Uncle Sam*, that the preparations were being made for their benefit, and that a number of them went on board and virtually took possession. She takes about seventy passengers, and is going to Acapulco. Most of those on board doubtless go for the purposa of joining the successful revolutionary party of Mexico.

ANOTHER STREET FIGHT.—One of the semi-occasional street fights, for which San Francisco is becoming celebrated, came off about noon to-day on Merchant street, above Montgomery. This locality seems to have become a favorite battle ground of late. In this case, the combatants were gentlemen of the legal fraternity, and the weapons used, fists. One called the other a liar, which was resented by a blow, followed with several more on either side. No serious injury resulted to either party.

SENT UP AGAIN.—Mary Holt, an incorrigible drunkard, who has literally resided in the station house and jail for the past three years, was brought up before the Mayor this morning, on the usual charge of being found in a state of beastly intoxication. She was only discharged from a sixty days term in the county jail yesterday, morning, and his Honor sent her up again for thirty more.
