Mist.—Thursday was a dark day, owing to a heavy mist which lowered upon the city and the distant mountains till about 2 o'clock, p. m., when it lifted itself up, for an hour or so, and disclosed the snow-capped tops of the Sierra Nevada range in a blaze of sunshine, which refracted upon the clouds, producing a panoramic effect grand and beautiful in the extreme. Between 3 and 4 o'clock it closed down again, like an impenetrable curtain, and quenched the thermometer of rising hopes which many misled persons were disposed to indulge of a termination to the rain. The streets of the city were crowded with persons whose hurried motions testified that business, to some extent, was pursuing its customary channels.
