

INDIAN DIFFICULTIES.—Another difficulty has occurred in Mariposa county, which as usual, has terminated fatally to the unfortunate aborigines. It appears that a few days ago, some animals were stolen from the neighborhood of Mariposita, and suspicion rested on a tribe of Indians who lived in the mountains. Some 40 or 50 armed men, a few days ago, left camp to inflict punishment on the suspected parties; they attacked the rancharia and killed some five of the Indians. A Merced Indian was amongst the dead, who was at the time merely on a visit to the tribe. Some trouble is anticipated from the unfortunate occurrence.
