

The yellow fever is raging with fatal violence at Panama.

A serious accident occurred to Gen. Pierce on the Boston and Maine railroad, on the 6th of January. The cars were thrown off the track, and the son of the president-elect was killed.

A revolution is expected in Spain, owing to the recent restrictions on the right of suffrage.

The news from Mexico is of unusual importance. Arista has been driven from the presidency by the chief justice of the supreme court, Ceballas. Imitating Cromwell and Louis Napoleon, he has taken the administration of the law into his own hands, and has driven the members from Congress at the point of the bayonet. The country is in a deplorable condition.

THE INDIAN DIFFICULTIES.—We have received the following account of the recent Indian difficulties in Mariposa county :

HEATH & EMORY'S, Feb. 4th, 1853.

I saw Capt. Powell this evening, just from

Mariposa, who states that on last Wednesday week a party composed of Mercedé, Chowchilla and Mariposa Indians congregated together near Mariposita, some eight miles below the city of Mariposa, and committed a horrible murder, by killing a man by the name of S.arkie, who it appears was alone in his tent. On Thursday, a party of white men found him with his head burnt off. They immediately went to Mariposa, and gave the alarm; when a party, headed by the deputy sheriff, Mr. Rowe, went out in pursuit of the Indians; they came upon them on Friday morning about daylight, advanced to within thirty or forty steps, and opened a fire on them. The Indians stood and fought bravely for some time, and there were from twenty to forty of their number killed, and many wounded. No whites were killed during the engagement, though several were wounded with arrows. Mr. Rowe received a wound somewhere in the leg.

It was currently reported in Mariposa and Agua Fria, that the Indians had killed Charley Converse and his wife, on the San Joaquin, and that they had fought the regulars stationed at Fort Miller, some three hours; but the truth of this is not known.

On the Sunday following, steps were being taken to follow in pursuit of the Indians. I will give you further particulars in a few days. The Indians of whom Major Savage had charge were recognized in the fray.
