 A gentleman who has a farm in the vicinity of an Indian encampment above this city, near the Sacramento river, informs us that within a few days, some forty Indians have arrived in parties of two or three, from the northern part of the State. He has been informed by the Chief of the Valley tribe that they have come as emissaries to inform them of the general rising in the north, and to urge them to assist in expelling the whites. The Indians in the valley are too weak to assist, and they have become so dependent as to have no disposition to join their more valorous brethren. The appearance of the northern Indians among them has however, had the effect of making them more bold in their petty thieving of the crops of the farmers in that vicinity.—*State Journal.*
