MINERS MURDERED BY THE INDIANS—Mr. Charles Carpenter, of Cohoes, N. Y., and Mr. Hilliard A. Sweed, of Boston, Mass., miners, started from Feather river in August last, intending to be absent for three or four days on a prospecting tour, and have not yet returned. As they left their matters in an unsettled state, considerable anxiety was felt on the part of their friends and acquaintances. Nothing has been heard of them however, until a few days since it was ascertained from some Indians that they had been murdered while sleeping, by some of their tribe who are hostile to the whites. They both have families at home.
